#### 1. Background

The CDM has been a success beyond expectations and contributed greatly to mitigation efforts and sustainable development, but has also been criticized and faces many challenges. The post-2020 climate regime is to be agreed next year in Paris, meaning that fundamental decisions regarding the CDM's future are due to be taken. There is also an urgent need to implement global actions to cut greenhouse gas emissions before 2020 to address the gap between current emission pledges and the reductions needed to keep global warming below 2°C target. To achieve this target, there is a need to identify and implement opportunities to immediately mitigate climate change.

A discussion paper was sent in advance to all the participants. It contains the description of key trend in the climate change world, possible options for the future of the CDM and potential areas of work that could allow it to reach its potential for contributing to the combat against climate change both pre- and post-2020.

#### 2. Objectives and outputs of the workshop

This workshop aims at exploring new areas where the CDM can be deployed to contribute in an efficient and cost effective way to the closure of the pre-2020 gap and beyond. This could include through finding ways to reach its full potential by transposing itself into an instrument going beyond offsetting in the context of the Kyoto Protocol. For this purpose, it will bring together stakeholders in the CDM, CDM think tank, experienced and visionary actors of the CDM to share their experiences and most importantly their vision on the future of the CDM.

#### 3. Target participants

The workshop will bring together key stakeholders of CDM, think tanks and visionary actors and participants from public, commercial, and not-for-profit entities, including CMEs and project participants.

Subject to discussion, a CDM-type approach is taken to mean, in particular, sub-national 'project' boundaries, standardised baseline construction, approved emissions reduction methodology, and eligibility for award of actual or potential economic value, linked to the quantum of additional emissions reductions shown by standardised monitoring and verification to have been achieved.
