1. Background

The Conference of the Parties serving as the meeting of the Parties to the Kyoto Protocol (CMP) has repeatedly requested the secretariat to continue enhancing its support for countries underrepresented in the CDM, in particular the least developed countries, small island developing States and African countries, by providing support in specific technical areas of the Clean Development Mechanism (CDM).

The aim of this workshop is, thus, to provide CDM Designated National Authorities (DNAs) from the African region with the training they require functioning effectively; improving information sharing, outreach and exchange of views on activities; and providing updates of the current market situation.

As part of the planning activities for the year 2014, the CDM Executive Board, in its management plan requested the secretariat to organise regional events for the benefit of DNAs. The UNFCCC secretariat is seeking collaboration opportunities to extend the participation to those events to private sector representatives: PPs, CMEs etc. through partnership with various partners.

The agenda is comprised by 2 main pillars, "Training" and "Promotion of the CDM" with special emphasis given to finance, sustainable development co-benefits, stakeholder consultation, CDM PoAs and the process of issuing letters of approval/authorization.

2. Objectives and outputs of the workshop

Objectives:

i) Training

Enhance capacity of DNAs and other stakeholders to identify areas of improvement with regards to LoAs approval process, analysis of the sustainable development co-benefits of CDM projects, and how to conduct an effective stakeholder consultation process. In addition, the aim is to update the participants on the current CDM requirements for PoAs and the recent developments in the regulatory framework; and to obtain their views and input for the improvement of this framework.

ii) Promotion of the CDM

Showcase the current possible sources of finance for CDM and mitigation in general, including from the Green Climate Fund (GCF), multilateral banks, national development agencies, and Nairobi Framework Partners. Additionally, to present the CDM Executive Board's current strategy to increase demand for CERs through cooperation with the public and private sectors in compliance and voluntary markets.

3. Target participants

The workshop will bring together participants from DNAs and national focal points, to hear from and discuss with representatives from public, commercial, and not-for-profit entities, including CMEs and project participants.

It is expected that the diverse audience share their experiences on the different roles they play regarding CDM project development and implementation, allowing for rich discussions and learning opportunities for all participants.
