Background

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- Regional Climate Weeks are a series of annual events organized in Africa, Asia-Pacific, and Latin America and the Caribbean by core and regional partners.
- The Regional Climate Weeks have evolved and grown from the Regional Carbon Forums organized by the Nairobi Framework Partnership since 2007.
- The Regional Climate Weeks aim to **foster engagement** between governments and non-government stakeholders with the common goal of addressing climate change.
- Discussions around CDM, climate finance, NDC implementation, climate action, carbon markets, etc. are usually the focus of the Climate Weeks' agenda.












 There has been growing interest from partners, key regional players, governments and stakeholders to strengthen the Regional Climate Weeks owing to their enhanced performance across all regions over the years:




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Why are the Regional Climate Weeks Important for DNAs?

- 1. They facilitate the understanding of the general climate change issues, challenges and barriers faced in the regions, needed policies and status of negotiations by promoting debate and knowledge sharing among different stakeholders
- 2. They offer opportunities for regional players to organize events during the week aiming at advancing climate change issues, including the CDM.
- 3. They provide avenues to **showcase progress and present new commitments and opportunities** in the regions.
- 4. They **support the local governments** in raising the profile of region-specific climate change discussions and advancing their climate change agendas through the ministerial segments.
